COVID-19: Wyoming

Insight — April 3, 2020

Restrictions on Private Business Operations

- Two orders have been issued by the Wyoming Governor Gordon and Department of Health:
- To close all restaurants, bars, theaters, gymnasiums, childcare facilities, K-12 schools, colleges, universities, and trade schools in the state. Restaurants can continue drive-through and delivery services.
- To limit gatherings to ten (10) people and practice social distancing.

Healthcare Provisions

 All Wyoming senior centers and long-term care units are closed to the public to protect residents from this virus. Generally, hospitals are asking to limit visitation to patients to one at a time, if at all.

Support for Impacted Businesses

 Governor Gordon has formed five task forces, including one for businesses that will focus on "banking resiliency" and the state's small businesses, which the Governor terms as the Wyoming economy's life blood. This task force in its early stages.

Support for Impacted Workers

In most cases unemployment benefits are available to workers who
are unemployed through no fault of their own, including if an
employer must shut down operations and no work is available.

Travel Restrictions and Advisories

• Wyoming has directed residents and businesses to follow the travel guidelines issued by the Center for Disease Control.

Current Status of Legislature

 Wyoming's 2020 legislative session ended March 12th. The legislators have not currently set a date for a special session this summer, it is almost certain there will be one relating to the COVID-19 issues.

State and Local Tax

Tax filing moved to July 15, 2020.
